Greetings Comrades,

I am often asked to provide various write ups from time to time. As some of you may have noticed, I don't always write for the general orders. I feel like, many times, the same information is stated over and over, and in an effort to reduce that regurgitation, I try to make sure I have a reason for my write ups. With this being a newly revived publication, I wanted to try something a little different.

WHAT WE SAY ABOUT OUR ORGANIZATION WITHOUT SAYING ANYTHING

I was once a part of a flag retirement ceremony that was being held in conjunction with a local Scout group. The function was great! It involved the local community, and many of the Scouts' parents and even grandparents were in attendance. I firmly believe this is something the VFW should do more often because it makes our organization more visible in the community and shows we are more than just a building for veterans to gather in. While at this event, one of our veterans, while wearing an honor guard uniform, walked in front of a group of Scouts and their parents while smoking. I quickly asked the Comrade to please excuse themselves away from the guests while smoking, or to put the cigarette out. Even though he complied, the veteran was upset because "he had every right to smoke wherever he wanted and he smoked in front of his kids their whole lives, and they turned out fine!" While all of this may be true, we also have to consider the image this conveys to the public.

A Comrade once told me that when they enlisted, they were not asked whether they wanted a smoking barracks or not – they were all smoking. I didn't say anything at the time, but I can also say that I was not asked whether I wanted a smoking barracks or not – they were all NON-smoking. During my time in the military, we were not allowed to walk and smoke while in uniform and were constantly reminded to be very aware of what we do in uniform as it affects the whole organization. The military has changed their rules throughout the years, and I feel our organization needs to change as well. There is nothing wrong with smoking, and each individual has the right to make that decision for themselves. But when we are in public representing the VFW, how we appear, and the image we convey affects more than just the person wearing the shirt or uniform. What if there was a mother who was eligible in the crowd that day? Could seeing this prevent her from becoming a part of our organization? Or what about the



children at the event? Will that image forever be what they associate the VFW with? The VFW is not a chain of bars that do not care about the communities they are in. The VFW is a great organization that supports veterans throughout our communities – and that is the image I hope we all want to portray.

When I'm out in public, I constantly try my hardest to consider what I may be saying while I am silent, and I know I am definitely not perfect – I catch myself doing stupid things pretty regularly. But when I am representing the VFW, I always try to ensure I'm giving the organization the best image I can. The story I used above is just one of many instances where we may be setting an image unintentionally. My goal with sharing this is that when you are out representing the VFW, you take an extra second to ask yourself "how will this look to the community?" And if ever approached to make a change or adjustment to help this image, you don't take it personally. We are all in this together!

For those who are not familiar with the MOC & MOC Auxiliary, here is what we are and what we do:

The Military Order of the Cootie of the United States is a non-profit Veterans Service Organization. We are known as "**The Honor Degree of the VFW**" and our members are comprised of the officers and leadership of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. Membership in the MOC is recognition of outstanding service to the VFW and its programs.

Founded in New York City on September 17, 1920, the MOC is based on the principals of good humor and fun. Over the past ninety years, the Cooties have provided social and entertainment programs to members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. as an Ancillary unit within the organization. Since 1923, our first year as a part of the VFW, the Cooties have worked hard to further the aims of the VFW while adding to it the frivolity known as Military Humor to the serious work of our parent organization. What would ultimately become known as the VFW National Home for Children, a sprawling campus of homes located in Eaton Rapids, Michigan, started out as the brainchild of the MOC. We firmly believe in caring for the widows and children of our Armed Forces. Literally millions of dollars have been raised and donated to help "our kids" over our history; starting with the library, the swimming pool, the Fire Department, and a host of other projects designed to make life fun and educational for the children during their stay at the National Home.

With the outbreak of World War II, the Cooties recognized a need to entertain hospitalized troops and veterans during their confinement and rehabilitation at Veterans Administration facilities throughout the country. Our service program is



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described as a directive to "Keep 'em Smiling in Beds of White." Each year the Cooties volunteer thousands of hours of time worth over ten million dollars to DVA Hospitals and domiciliaries throughout the United States. This work, in addition to the hours of service donated as active members of the VFW, set the members of the MOC apart as Foreign Service and Combat Veterans who are fully engaged in their communities, and their fellow comrades in arms and their families. Our distinctive red hat and unusual uniform sets us apart and draws attention to the plight of those less fortunate than ourselves. We sacrifice a little of ourselves to bring a smile or a laugh during what is normal.

VFW Commemorates National Borinqueneers Day

The storied Army regiment from Puerto Rico celebrated for its many accomplishments

WASHINGTON (April 13, 2022) — Today the VFW joins a grateful nation in commemorating National Borinqueneers Day, named in honor of the brave Soldiers of the 65th Infantry Regiment of the United States Army.

Nicknamed during the Korean War for the original inhabitants of the island of Puerto Rico, the Borinqueneers have a long and storied history dating back to its inception as the first all-Hispanic military unit in 1899. Since then, the 65th would go on to serve with distinction in defending the Panama Canal Zone during WWI and saw action in North Africa, France and Germany during WWII.

During the Korean War, the 65th Infantry was heralded for their exceptional courage, tenacity and sacrifice. They were awarded battle participation credits for nine campaigns, lauded for their bravery at the Battle of Chosin Reservoir, and credited with the last battalion-sized bayonet charge in U.S. Army history. Among their numerous awards for valor from the Korean War are two Presidential Unit Citations, 2,771 Purple Heart Medals, 606 Bronze Stars, 256 Silver Stars, and ten Distinguished Service Crosses, one of which was upgraded to the Medal of Honor in 2014.

In April 13, 2016, the Borinqueneers were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal for their many contributions to the Armed Forces of the United States. In January 2021, members of Congress passed legislation making National Borinqueneers Day law, celebrating this valorous unit for the first time April 13 last year.

Today, the legacy elements of the 65th Infantry Regiment continue to serve where and when it's called upon as part of the Puerto Rican National Guard.

From all of the 1.5 million members of the VFW and its Auxiliary, we salute all Borinqueneers, both past, present and future, as well as all who serve in the U.S. military from Puerto Rico. Thank you for all you've done and continue to do for our great nation.
