#### From the Commanders Desk:

The only other way I can think of is for me to do the absolute best I can for the members of the VFW and the Auxiliary during my year as Commander, that's a promise.

The National Convention in Kansas City was back to its normal full-blown celebration of the VFW and the Auxiliary. Without a doubt our hospitality suite was absolutely the best one I visited; an opinion shared by many. Our hospitality team Dave Fradenburg and Cheryl Brown worked their butts off making it the best. A very heart felt thank you to both, all the volunteers who pitched in and to our partners from Michigan. Hopefully all who attend the Convention learned something to make their Post, District or Department better in the coming year.

The Post in Vincennes had a very "hot" golf outing. It's a wonder they could even have one after all the rain in the week prior to and even the day before. But all in all, the golf was good, considering I was probably one of the worst golfers out there. The Post had great food and some excellent entertainment in the evening for everyone. Some of the golfers on Sunday morning may have enjoyed the Post a little bit too much. Some brief updates:

The VFW Service Office now has an office in the Indiana Veterans Center at Building 777 on North Meridian. This office is manned two days a week allowing Veterans to apply for VA benefits without the hassle of the Federal Building. Plans are to have a Service Officer in Roudebush Department of Veterans' Affairs Medical Center as soon as we can work out the details. Call the service office to see when they are available to help you with your VA benefits -317-916-1937.

The Department Council of Administration has approved our new Standard Operating Procedures. The newly approved SOP will hopefully make operation of the Department more consistent. The line officers and many of the Committee Chairperson's developed Indiana's first ever Commanders Manual. The manual provides a comprehensive guide for Post Commanders, including the 2022-2023 All-State Membership Program and the updated Department Awards program. The School of Instruction was extremely well attended, the majority of attendees being first timers. Jerry Blake the Dean of the School did an outstanding job preparing the agenda and the instructors for a day of learning more about VFW programs. All the Instructors where well prepared and presented up to date information in a very professional manner. The HQ staff worked hard getting everything in place and the lunch was worth standing in line for. Thank you to everyone involved – I think it was a very successful

Terri and I had the very unique opportunity this past week to delivered supplies to the flood victims of Eastern Kentucky on behalf of the Department of Indiana Veterans of Foreign Wars. On Monday evening myself, Greg Osborne and Mike Seeman went to a warehouse in downtown Indy operated by the Veterans Support Council of Indianapolis. Don Hawkins donated the supplies, then him and his crew helped us load my trailer and completely fill my pickup truck including the backseat. We loaded everything from water and meals ready to eat, baby food, blankets and hair brushes, just to name some of the items. Tuesday morning at 0630 hours Terri and I headed for VFW Post 7387 in Hazard, Kentucky. We arrived at the Post right after lunch and started unloading with the help of local volunteers. The closer we got to Hazard the worse it got, the damage was just unbelievable.

In this part of Kentucky, it is very mountainous. On one side of the road are mountains and the other is a river, typically the riverbed is 25-30 feet below the road. In several places the flood waters had washed over the road, sadly marked by a large collection of debris. Everything from cars to large parts of houses and many unrecognizable items. In many places you could tell where a house once stood but nothing remains now except a foundation! In and around the rivers beds you could see all types of flood debris – cars and trucks, chunks of houses, appliances, clothes, kid's toys, a trailer house, parts of everything. Some of the debris well over 25-30 feet up in the trees.

Local volunteers at the Post told us what we saw was nothing compared to the back country. At county crossroads were once stood a few houses, normally a convenience store and maybe a church. There is nothing now, nothing at all. In some places you can't even fine the foundations, they are buried in the mud! We heard stories of triumphs, like a young man saving one woman's life and kidding he got to second base with her while rescuing her, I don't think she minded. To absolutely horrible unbelievable stories of a husband and wife trying to save their four small children but sadly losing all four to the flood waters. Jerry, the Post Commander an old Vietnam Veteran like myself said there are 39 confirmed dead, but close to hundred still missing, he lamented that "some will never be found".

They still need lots of help but probably not the kind of help we were lucky enough to deliver. What they told us they need now are cleanup supplies. Brooms, mops, shovels, rakes, squeegees, wet/dry vacuums, power washers, dehumidifiers and all kinds of cleaning supplies. I would recommend purchasing these items at your favorite online store and shipping them directly to the Hazard VFW Post 7387.

I look forward to all the Post anniversaries coming up in the next couple of months. We have several Posts celebrating 100 year anniversaries, some with 75 year anniversaries and a few 50 years. What a great accomplishment maintaining a Post to celebrate serving Veterans and your Community for a Century. I look forward to all the events I have the privilege of attending on your behalf. In September we have V-J Day, POW/MIA ceremonies, 9/11 Remembrances, the National Home, State Campout and District meetings. It's going to be a busy month.

One thing I mentioned many times at the School of Instruction and at the Council of Administration meeting was the Stats membership numbers. At the end of VFW year 2021-2022 the State was at 24,545 members! Just a few years ago we were over 40,000 members, during Buzz's year, we are losing about 2000 members per year. That's not deaths, it is simply members not renewing, we have to fix this and soon. Our Membership team has some great plans and are working hard but they can't do it alone. I have said it a thousand times, MEMBERSHIP IS EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY! If each of us sign up just one new member or get one prior member to come back to the VFW, the State would be near 50,000 members at the end of the year. Just think about it – ONE NEW MEMBER!

The Auxiliary President Harriet Figg and I are working together on every aspect of the VFW of Indiana. We share many of the same aspirations for the Department and are determined to have a successful VFW year. But, we can't do it without every member working with us.

You may need to ask an impartial person to step in as a mediator. Start at the Post level, if this doesn't work go to District and then to State.

The motto of the VFW is "No one does more for Veterans." If you find a veteran in need, assist them. Find out why they are in need and how you can help them. Do they need someone to talk to? Do they need assistance with filing a disability claim? Do they need to know what resources are available? Find out what the veteran needs and then put that Veteran in touch with someone that can assist them. Do you know a veteran that has an illness and can't get out? Call, text, email or visit this veteran. It is the little things that make a difference!

#### MESSAGES FROM OUR AUXILIARY


Hello Indiana Combat Veterans:

"This program is very near and Dear to my Heart. It mean a Great Deal to me" John Commented as he opened the Ceremony with the playing of video of Commander-In-Chief Fritz Michelcic and Lynn Rolf explaining the program. John then told a little history of the Military Working Dogs and his experiences as a Scout Dog handler in Vietnam. "I owe Artus so much and I give him all the credit for allowing me to come home without a scratch"

Three Certificates were presented to John. The 1<sup>st</sup> was for MWD Artus, the dog he had in Vietnam. The other two Certificates were for the two retired MWD that John had adopted. Sgt. Abel that had past in 2017 and his present MWD, SFC Brutusz. "Our dogs in Vietnam were credited with saving over 10,000 lives. They were known as America's Forgotten Heroes. So anytime that we can recognize or talk about our Military Working Dogs it just more awareness of how these dogs have and are serving our Country with Courage, Loyalty and Honor" John continued "I want to Thank the Chief Fritz, Lynn and Project K9 Hero for making this program a reality. It's very special and just another reason why I am proud to be a member of the VFW."

Also participating in the Ceremony along with John and SFC Brutusz was the Department of Indiana Sr. Vice Commander Richard Leirer and past State Commander David Capshaw.







#### SGT. ABEL N247

Sgt. Abel was born on 1 Dec. 2007. He was inducted in the United States Army on 8 Dec. 2008. He was trained at Lackland AFB. As a Patrol and Drug Dog. He gained his eligibility for the VFW REDD program when he was Deployed to South Korea. He served with the 55<sup>th</sup> Military Police BN at Camp Casey and the 544<sup>th</sup> MP Bn. At Camp Humphies. He was retired on 23 Aug. 2016. John was able to adopt Sgt. Abel and he, along with the United States War Dog Association paid \$1500 to have Sgt. Abel returned back to the United States. Due to a Medical issue, Sgt. Abel Passed on 7 Sept. 2017 and received full Military Honors on 19 Sept. 2017.









### "ARTUS" K012

Artus was born in Dec. 1965 in Germany. He was purchased for 500 Deutsche Mark, which was worth \$125 in 1966, and was Inducted into the US Army on 19 Dec. 1966. He trained at Fort Benning Ga. As a Scout Dog. He gained his eligibility for the VFW REDD Program when he was deployed to Vietnam in July 1966. While serving in Vietnam, he was assigned to the 42<sup>nd</sup> Scout Dog Platoon which was attached to the 101<sup>st</sup> Airborne Division. John was his 6<sup>th</sup> handler and he credits Artus with allowing him to come home without a scratch. Artus was Killed In

Action on 11 December, 1970.









#### SFC. BRUTUSZ T434

SFC. Brutusz was born on 3 April 2011 in Germany. He was inducted in the United States Army in Sept. 2012. He trained at Lackland AFB as a Patrol Explosive Detection Dog. After his training he was assigned to 520<sup>th</sup> Military Police Detachment in Schofield Barracks Hawaii in Oct. 2013. He gained his eligibility to the VFW REDD Program when he was deployed to the Sinai Peninsula in May 2017 until Feb. 2018. While there he searched over 5,000 vehicles at the North Camp. During a "Passing of the Leash" Ceremony on 2 Nov. 2018 at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, SFC. Brutusz was awarded a Certificate of Meritorious Service

Hello Department of Indiana,

I was asked to submit an article about the submarine force. Hopefully I can give you some insight on Submarine history and the men and women that serve on them.

The United States Submarine Force started in April of 1900 when an Irish immigrant name John P Holland was awarded the contract for our first submarines. The Holland class boats were crewed by 4 to 6 men and an officer and powered by gas engines. They were not the first submarines used in warfare by the United States. As far back as the Revolutionary War, The Turtle made the first attack against a man of war unsuccessfully.

In the Civil war the CSS Hunley successfully attacked and badly damaged a Union man of war. But the crew of the Hunley did not survive.

The Modern submarine force started with Holland class submarines and took a different breed of men to serve on them. Joyce Brothers a famous TV Phycologist was asked what kind of men serve on these boats. To paraphrase her analysis, the men that serve on submarines are not foolhardy far from it, they are more self-aware than most people. They understand the risks and dangers serving on these ships. They do not volunteer to prove something; they do not do it for bravado. They do it to challenge themselves and to understand the dangers and overcome them. They know they can do everything right and still be claimed by the sea. She said this shortly after the loss of the USS Thresher. The first of two nuclear powered boats lost and on eternal patrol.

The Men and women of the submarine force are some of the most intelligent people you will meet especially the "nukes" the people that operate the reactor on the boats. All personal that report to a submarine must "qualify" and earn the Undersea warfare pin (dolphins) They have a year to do so. To qualify they must have a thorough understanding of all the ships systems and be able to explain the operation and location of all the components of those systems to a subject matter expert. Once they have a checkout on all the systems on board, they must go on a walk thru with a senior enlisted crew member and get a checkout from him, the next step is a board. Consisting of 3 to 5 enlisted personal and 1 officer, the board will test the knowledge and demeanor of the individual. That individual will have to draw any system asked of him and the physical location of all its components. They are asked what to do in emergency operations and how to isolate any component on the boat. This board can take anywhere from 2 hours to 2 days. Once this is done there is a Captain's interview. All this is done so the crew can learn to trust and be able to depend on the individual reporting onboard.

The military bearing on a submarine is a little lax. Any crew member can correct any other. That means a lowly seaman(E3) could callout the Captain if needed. Casualties onboard a submarine can cause its loss in seconds. A small fire in its biggest compartment could become untenable in as little as 2 minutes. So, reactions have to be second nature and correct every time.

The boats and their crew are dependent each other and tight knit very much like special forces, squad level infantry and have a esprit da corps that rival the United States Marines.

These Boats and crews carried the war in the Pacific after the Pearl Harbor attack in December of 1941. Admiral Nimitz A submariner himself knew this was going to be the case, so much so his change of command was held on the deck of a submarine. The US submarine force was comprised of less than 2 percent of the U.S. Navy during WWII but sank more than any other units or force of the Navy, over 60 percent of the Japanese shipping that was loss was due to these Boats and their men, but at a heavy cost 52 boats are on Eternal Patrol by the wars end. The Casualty rate was 1 in 4 men. That is higher than even the loses of the Eight Air Force during the war.

John F. Kennedy once said "A nation reveals itself not only by the men it produces, but also the men it honors, the men it remembers".

Shortly after WWII a group of these men formed a Veterans organization that would become the USSVI or the United States Submarine Veterans Inc. The Creed of this organization is:

Our purpose is to perpetuate the memory of our shipmates who gave their lives in the pursuit of their duties while serving their country. That their dedication, deeds and supreme sacrifice be a constant source of motivation toward greater accomplishments. To pledge loyalty and patriotism to the United States of America and its Constitution.

The men and women of the USSVi honor those losses with Toiling of the boats before every meeting for the boats lost during that month in history. They hold ceremonies every Memorial Day weekend to toil all the boats and shipmates lost. They erect memorials and displays around the country to remind the people of the submariners and the boats. I have the honor of commanding the Hoosier Base of the USSVi here in Indiana. By an act of congress each state was assigned a boat on eternal patrol from WWII to honor those men and their boat. Indiana's boat is the USS Greyback (SS-208) Lost on 26 February 1944 with her entire crew of 80 men. The Hoosier base is the keeper of their memorial. It is located at the Indiana Military Museum in Vincennes, IN. We also erected a display consisting of the USS Indianapolis (SSN-697) Sail in the parking lot of the museum. The USSVi is open to any man or woman that Qualified-on submarines and anyone that would like to be an associate with a sponsorship of a member are more than welcome.

As our Memorial Day ceremony states as long as two comrades are there to remember those before them so too does the USSVi remember our shipmates.

I hope this long winded article helps you understand the submariners in your life and help us to remember our shipmates.





I have attended all of the VFW National Conventions as a delegate of my post since 2015. I have also attended all Indiana VFW Conferences and Conventions except 1 since 2015.


